Gardening Tips for September in Zone 5 (Redfield)

Fall is teasing us – three or four days in the upper 80's then a week in the low 70's. To be honest I am tired of messy garden plants, weeds in the garden beds, and tomatoes that are split. It seems like I am pulling up tired plants and putting them in the compost bins while putting weeds in the garbage bins to go to the landfill. The garden is getting "put to bed" for tis year although I still have a few plants that are producing.

One of my plantings that are doing well is the Black Beauty eggplants. I planted way too may of this variety and can hardly give them away, I guess they will end up at the food bank. We are also getting an abundance of apples – they too will go to the food bank or to the Stuart Library for those who like to make apple deserts.

Along with growing apples comes the task of ground cleanup. Every morning, I scoop up apples that have dropped from the trees and put them in the compost bins. Picking them up will minimize disease pressures next year with the new growing season

Gardening "To Do" Tips by Month for Redfield, IA

Janell's tips for October:

- Put potting soil in a place where it will not freeze so it will be available if you want to repot plants or start your plants in the spring.
- Flower bulbs need to be planted at this time
- •Tulip, Iris and other spring and summer flowering perennials can be divided and have their foliage cut back then replant and water.
- •Mint, dill, and other herbs should be harvested. Dry or freeze these herbs to preserve them.
- •Remove, cut and compost asparagus tops after they turn brown and have died back. Another option is to leave the dead tops to provide shelter for animals during the winter. Burn them off in the spring before the new shoots emerge from the soil.
- •October is a good time to amend your soil. Add leaves and or compost to increase the organic material in your soil. Save wood ashes, this will increase the phosphorus, potassium, and calcium in your soil. Use these ashes in your vegetable gardens and flower beds.
 - Dig Dahlia plants and save them in your basement in a brown paper bag, Check once a month and spritz with water to keep moist
 - •Clean, sharpen, and oil (sparingly) your tools for the winter

Carolyn's tips for October:

- Watch the weather and harvest any remaining summer produce like beans, eggplant, peppers and tomatoes before a hard frost
- •By October, most pumpkins, winter squash, and gourds are ready to be harvested. The fruit is ready to harvest when the vines start to dry. It works best to cut the stem with garden pruners; this should be done before the first frost.
- •Fall is the best time to plant most trees and shrubs because it is cooler, but still warm enough to promote growth. As long as the ground is not frozen, you can plant. Be sure to water the new tree at planting and afterward. Use mulch to help retain moisture, but do not put it up against the tree
 - Put protection around young trees that are susceptible to deer or rabbit damage
- •Since many ornamental grasses are attractive in the garden during the winter, they are usually cut back in the late winter or early spring. Not cutting them in the fall also helps protect the crown throughout the winter.
 - Drain your hoses and empty the birdbath before a hard frost.
- •Potted perennials can be buried in an empty part of the vegetable garden or surrounded with a thick layer of straw to get them through the cold winter months
- •Some bulbs need to be dug up and stored for the winter and replanted in the spring. This includes dahlias, cannas, caladiums, gladiolus, elephants' ears, and calla lilies. To dig dahlia tubers, (which will be a large clump), use a spade or a fork spade. These are to be dug after the frost has killed the foliage and leaves are vellow or dving back.
- •SAVE SEEDS from favorite self-pollinating, non-hybrid flowers such as marigolds by allowing the flower heads to mature. Lay seeds on newspaper and turn them as they dry. Store the dry seeds in glass jars or envelopes in a cool, dry, dark place.
 - •Leave seeds on asters, sunflowers, and cosmos for the birds to eat throughout the winter.
- •Bring in houseplants when nighttime temperatures fall to 55 degrees F. Wash off pots and foliage. Soak the pot in a tub of lukewarm water for about 15 minutes to force insects out. Another option is to treat plants with a systemic insecticide at least a week before taking it inside. Check to see if roots are coming through the bottom of the pot, and if it is so, the plant must be replanted. If the plants have gotten leggy through the summer, remove them from the container and prune the top and bottom equally. Repot in a clean pot with fresh potting soil.
- •Mow until the grass stops growing. Grass that is too long is more likely to become damaged over the winter. MAP YOUR GARDEN (THIS YEAR), THIS WILL HELP PLAN NEXT YEARS PLANTING!!

Redfield Clinic News

<u>Measles</u> are continuing to spread primarily among the unvaccinated. According to the Center for Disease Control more than 1,500 cases of measles have been confirmed in the United States. Sadly three individuals have died from measles including 2 children in West Texas. Measles are highly contagious but preventable by vaccination. 185 individuals with measles have required hospitalization.

By the year 2000 measles had been eliminated from the United States thru vaccination. The only reported cases were found in people who move here from other countries.

The incubation period for measles is usually 7 to 14 days, after exposure. Symptoms include fever, cough, watery eyes and runny nose, followed by a rash in 3-5 days. Complications from measles include croup, pneumonia, ear infections, hearing loss, blindness and swelling of the brain. The measles vaccination is highly effective, up to 97% protective.

A <u>hand, foot and mouth disease</u> outbreak has been occurring in our schools. It is a viral disease characterized by head congestion and blisters on the hands, feet and in the mouth. There is no specific treatment other than treating the symptoms though the mouth blisters can be quite sore. Fortunately complications are rare. No vaccine is available for prevention.

Scattered <u>COVID -19</u> infections are occurring in our area. COVID boosters and flu vaccinations are available at clinics and at pharmacies. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.



The property must be a single-family residence, condominium or townhouse, and taxed as real property. *Houses being purchased under contract are not eligible.

What are the financial implications to the homeowner?

- The work is paid for by the Program through funding from the Dallas County Local Housing Trust Fund, Inc., the participating cities and other contributors.
- The financial assistance will be in the form of a forgivable loan with a maximum loan amount \$15,000 and a minimum loan amount \$500.
- The loan will be recorded as a mortgage on the property, with a term of five (5) years, decreasing 20% each
 year, and bearing no interest.
- The loan only comes due if the homeowner sells within the five years following the time of participation.

Rex J. Harvey Foundation

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
