Clinic Health Notes — May

Vote: It is good for your health. Yes, voting is our civic duty. But the act of voting can lower our risk of early death by 45% according to a study published in the May 2026 Journal of Gerontology. Other studies have already shown that altruistic acts like helping the poor, baby sitting and volunteering not only make you feel good but they also are good for your health and longevity.

Interestingly, the health benefit of voting occurred regardless of a person's wealth, education, political party or if your candidate won or lost. The voting benefit happened, even for those in poor health, and regardless of whether voting in person or remotely by mail.

Of course, we can elect officials who support good health policy like clean air, and clean water, soil conservation, bike and recreation trails, safer roads and vehicles and making immunizations available to all. Or we can elect those who have other priorities. We can ask those willing to run for office what their positions are on these health matters. Because all the wealth in the world does us no good if we don't have our health.

We should ask candidates for office what they plan to do about Iowa having the second highest rates of new cancers in our country. For more information about voting and candidates for office see the Iowa secretary of state's website <https://sos.iowa.gov/primary-election> For your health be sure you are registered to vote. Then vote in our Iowa Primary election on Tuesday, June 2, 2026 and in the general election on Tuesday, November 3, 2026.

Flu shot effective at keeping kids out of the hospital: A recent Center for Disease Control study showed the Influenza immunization was effective at reducing the chance of children being hospitalized for the flu.

Ticks: the lone star tick can cause red meat allergy. Red meat includes beef, pork, lamb, venison, goat and buffalo. This allergy can be life threatening. The lone star tick is found in Iowa. Pictures of ticks are available on the internet. Deer ticks can cause Lyme disease. Dog ticks can cause Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. It can be fatal. After being in the woods, be sure to check daily for ticks and remove them.

The Dallas County Sheriff's Office sent a report with 85 hours of patrol and 8 hours on calls for March. February report was included in council packet.

Fire Chief Mike Short reported 13 calls for March: 6 EMS, 5 fire, and 2 Fire/EMS.

Public Works reported Story Construction will be relining resin tanks. Public Works Director Tyler Clausen received his Grade 2 water certification. Hanging Rock lift station pump 2 failure due to clothing obstruction. Request for new pump so old pump could be rebuilt without interrupting system. Meyers motioned to approve request. Roberts seconded. All ayes, motion approved. Windstream boring issues were fixed.

Meyers made a motion and Stonehocker seconded to approve the consent agenda. Roll call vote — Paardekooper, Stonehocker, Roberts, Zeransky and Meyers all ayes. Motion carried.

The clerks reported community emergency alerts set up through TEXTMYGOV — sign up by texting REDFIELD to #91896. City Hall will be closed April 16th–17th and 21st for clerk training.

The 2025 audit report has been published, and a full copy of audit was included with council packet.

Library Director Ashley Kuonen reported a door count of 312. Library received \$950 memorial donation. Grant of \$2,200.00 matched by \$1,000.00 donation from community member was awarded. Adult craft night was a hit.

Under old business, resolution 2026-04 was approved — a compensation increase for employees who achieve professional certifications. Roll call vote, all ayes.

There being no further business, Stonehocker moved that the meeting adjourn, Zeransky seconded. Meeting adjourned at 9:03 P.M.

Guests: Legion Auxiliary — Bonnie Rote and Linda Cope inquired about hosting a monthly meal. They have a meeting the following night to discuss potentially hosting in May and will get back to Cristin.

Guests: Becky Tigges and Ben Clausen, representing South Dallas County Little League (ages 4–6th grade).

- Looking for funding to rehab fields in Redfield. The school approves repairs but does not fund them since it's not a school activity; they do mow and spray. Grants have been applied for but no response yet. Upper south ball field has no permanent fences. Funds go toward upkeep of equipment. Since the season is underway, any work would be done in the fall.
- Quotes from CW Fence and Gates: Dugouts and outfield fencing — \$15,900 · Outfield fencing only — \$12,000
- A decision will be given within 60 days. After further discussion, Cristin motioned to donate the full amount of \$15,900 to South Dallas County Little League. Kristy Z seconded. All ayes.

- **Dallas County expands Board of Supervisors to 5 members** — Following voter approval in 2024, Dallas County has finalized redistricting to expand from a 3-member to a 5-member Board of Supervisors. New district maps have been approved by the Secretary of State's office and will be in effect for the November 2026 election.
- **Guthrie County Road P28/Wagon Road closure — May through late summer** — A major construction project begins mid-May 2026 on County Road P28/Wagon Road between Stuart and Monteith Road, with the closure expected through late summer. A detour will run via White Pole Road, Highway 25, and Monteith Road/F51. A smaller temporary closure south of Nation's Bridge Park is set for May 5–10.
- **Middle River Arts Festival — May 2 in Winterset** — The Winterset Art Center is hosting a free, one-day arts festival at the Madison County Conservation Center on Saturday, May 2nd from 10am–4pm. Open to all ages, free admission.
- **John Wayne Birthday Celebration — May 22–23 in Winterset** — Madison County's annual celebration of hometown hero John Wayne returns May 22–23 in Winterset. A popular regional draw every spring.

● AROUND TOWN — GARDEN TASKS

Garden Tasks for May

Lawn: For a lush lawn, apply an organic fertilizer on schedule. For a three applications per year plan, apply first in early May, next in early September, and finally in late October.

Veggies: Plant summer crops — corn, beans, peppers, cucumbers, melons and squash. Warm season seed germinates best when the soil temperature is greater than 65 degrees.

Mid to late May is a good time to plant heat-loving herbs like basil, dill, fennel, marjoram or rosemary.

Late May is a good time to plant tomatoes, eggplant and pepper plants in the ground.

Tomatoes: Take off the bottom leaves and dig a deep hole. The tomatoes should be planted deeply, as they will grow roots along the buried stem for a sturdier plant. Support tomatoes soon after setting out — this helps with air flow and storm protection. Avoid planting tomatoes in the same spot every year to help curb disease. Grow enough plants that some loss doesn't ruin the season.

A thick layer of mulch (3–4 inches) in the garden paths will prevent weed growth and help preserve moisture.

Enjoy fresh snap peas, greens, broccoli and other goodies planted in early spring.

Visit the Master Gardener Plant Sale at the Dallas County Fairgrounds on May 2 from 9am to 2pm to find your favorites as well as unusual veggies, annuals, perennials and more.

Flowers: Start hand weeding to keep those weeds under control. Remove the entire root to prevent re-sprouting.

The safest time to buy and plant tender annuals is after Mother's Day when all danger of frost has passed.

For summer long bloomers like zinnias, poppies, cosmos, sunflowers, marigolds and other annuals, sow seeds early May directly into the beds. Keep soil moist for germination. Nasturtium and morning glory seeds sprout better if they are soaked overnight before planting.

Prune lilacs immediately after they finish blooming in May. Pruning later and you will be pruning off the buds for next year's blooms.

Bulbs: Don't trim tulip, daffodil or allium leaves yet. Wait at least 6 weeks for them to absorb the energy required for next year's bloom. Leaves should be turning yellow before trimming.

Houseplants: Most houseplants will like a shady outdoor location for summer. Pinch back and repot those that need it as you transition them and begin regular feeding if you didn't start earlier.

Wildlife: Hummingbirds are here! If you haven't already, clean your feeder and fill it with 1 part sugar to 4 parts clean, boiled water.

Redfield Public Library Regular Meeting

February 25, 2026 · Submitted by Carolyn Wilson

Call to order at 6:00 PM. Trustees present: Pauletta Cox, Lauren Lang, Julia Swallow, Carolyn Wilson. Library Director: Ashley Kuonen. Absent: Larry Moone.

Minutes from 1/28/2026 approved — moved by Cox, seconded by Lang. Agenda approved — moved by Wilson, seconded by Cox.

Financial Report: Wilson moved to pay outstanding bills totaling \$2,654.61. Seconded by Cox. Approved by all.

Progress & Service Report: Door count was 243 in January with 521 checkouts. Patron computers used 35 times; 91 wireless connections. Twelve programs offered in January with 55 participants.

In February, passive programs included Blind Date with a Book and a Scavenger Hunt. Popcorn and Movie Day drew a few patrons. Storytime on bread-making was rescheduled for March due to weather.

The community survey has been distributed but returns have been limited. Director Kuonen has been working with Biblionix to set up Gabbie in the library — setup pending. With actions from this meeting, Director Kuonen will be able to complete and submit the library's Accreditation to the State Library of Iowa.

The State Library has been approved by the Iowa Public Information Board to provide self-paced training on Iowa Code — required for all board members appointed after July 1, 2025, covering open meetings and open records laws.

Mayor Wiley met with Julia, Pauletta, and Director Kuonen to discuss library happenings. The meeting went well and the mayor plans to follow up after reviewing several items.

Upcoming events: Seed Starting Tips (March 5), Pocket Prairies (March 12), Adult Craft Night (April 1).

Unfinished Business: No update on Finance Policy. Lauren presented evaluation forms for approval — moved by Wilson, seconded by Cox. Approved by all.

New Business:

- Fundraising opportunities discussed — tabled due to insufficient manpower at this time.
- Community inquiries about sponsorships received — library is unable to accommodate at this time.
- Building Maintenance — a crash bar is needed on the front door for safety. The door was installed without board planning or approval; the board determined this should not be their expense.
- Circulation Policy updated and clarified — moved by Cox, seconded by Lang. Approved by all.
- Collection Policy updated to include Freedom to Read information — moved by Wilson, seconded by Lang. Approved by all.
- Personnel Policy submitted for updates — moved by Lang, seconded by Wilson. Approved by all.
- Policy Formatting — agreed.
- ADA Checklist for Existing Facilities — moved by Lang, seconded by Wilson. Approved by all.
- Possible Old Settlers activities discussed — tabled until theme is confirmed.
- Furniture plan: Wilson moved to proceed with adult seating, seconded by Lang. Approved by all.
- Chapters 11 and 13 of the Trustee Handbook discussed.

Motion by Wilson to adjourn. Seconded by Lang. Meeting adjourned at 7:40 PM. **Next meeting: March 25 at 6 PM.**

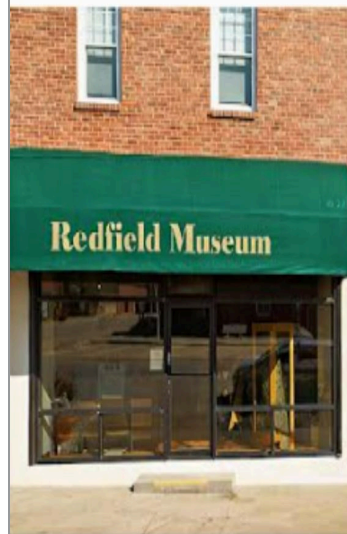
