Redfield Clinic News — July

Free physicals & vaccines: Redfield Clinic continues to offer free athletic physicals and vaccines for Redfield Clinic patients and all students without health insurance. This is a good time to update any immunizations that protect us from preventable illnesses that can cause serious disability or death. Staying up to date on these vaccinations protects ourselves and our new born babies and those with impaired immune systems, such as individuals receiving chemotherapy, who cannot take some of these vaccines.

Sadly, two children in Texas died of measles last year when people stopped getting their vaccines. And the USA had been measles free for more than 25 years prior than time. A vaccination rate of 95% of greater gives us "herd immunity" that stops transmission to those venerable among us. For those fearful of the discomfort of immunizations we at the clinic use numbing techniques like Lidocaine jell and cold packs to minimize pain. Remember vaccines are far safer than getting the illness. And "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

Taylor Wettach visits the Redfield Clinic: Taylor Wettach, candidate for State of Iowa Auditor, took time out of his busy schedule to visit the Redfield Clinic last week. Taylor resigned from his law firm after they succumbed to political pressure donating millions to another Trump fund. Such ethical principles are just what we need in our state auditor: someone who puts the interests of the tax payer foremost and does not yield to political pressure. We need someone who does the right thing regardless of political party or special interests. We discussed how to keep medical care in our small towns and how to have access to care for all.

Redfield Clinic News — July

Mr. Ed goes to Washington, D.C.: Ed attended the National Association of Rural Health Clinics Policy Summit June 10 & 11, 2026. While there he visited the Washington offices of four Iowa members of Congress (Rep. Nunn and Feenstra, and Senators Ernst and Grassley) to seek support for improving access to medical care, esp. in small towns. Iowa Senator Chuck Grassley, a longtime supporter of rural health, reports progress is being made on the bill to allow PAs and NPs to run Rural Health Clinics. A US House version already exists. H.R. 5199. Now a U.S. Senate version is more likely to be introduced. As you all recall from civics class, a bill must pass both the House and the Senate to become law after the President signs it. Thank you to all who took the time to write our Representative Nunn about keeping care accessible to all, including rural areas, through support of H.R. 5199. It is not too late to Google Rep. Nunn to ask him to support rural medical care by cosponsoring H.R. 5199. Please let me know of any response you received. Every bit of help counts in our efforts to keep care in our rural communities.

Redfield City Council — June 2, 2026*Submitted by Kate Paardekooper*

The Redfield City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, June 2, 2026. Mayor Wiley called the meeting to order at 7:05 P.M. Roll call: Meyers, Stonehocker, Roberts, Zeransky, L. Paardekooper, Attorney Schlagel, and Clerk K. Paardekooper were present.

- Meyers moved to approve the consent agenda, and Stonehocker seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- Meyers moved to approve the previous meeting minutes, and L. Paardekooper seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- Meyers moved to approve the financial report, and Roberts seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- The Dallas County Sheriff's Office reported 78 hours of patrol and 7 hours on calls, for a total of 85 hours.
- Fire Chief Short reported 16 calls total for the month of May for Fire and EMS. 6 Fire and 10 EMS, 1 billable to Linden. The outdoor warning siren is currently tested on the first Saturday of the month. Changing it to the first Wednesday of the month at 11 A.M., this would align with the communities around us. This change may potentially take effect January 1st, 2027.
- PW Director Clausen reported that a new pump will be needed in the future. He will get bids for the next meeting. Clausen will talk with - MIPA about grant opportunities. Discussion was held on the stop sign area outside of Casey's. Stonehocker will talk to the county to see if they have any suggestions for that area. Mower bids were tabled until next month.
- No Zoning report. No Code Enforcement report.
- Library Board President Swallow reported the door count for May was 259. The patron computers were used 44 times, and there were 112 wireless connections to the public Internet. A total of 88 reference questions were answered.
- The library received word from the State Library of Iowa that it met all standards for Tier 3 accreditation. Beginning July 1, 2026, the Redfield Public Library will be an accredited library and will receive Tier 3 funding. The library will remain accredited until June 30, 2029, and will need to renew its tier status in February 2029.
- Clerk Paardekooper reported that City Hall will be closed June 15th through June 18th, for Clerk school.
- Mayor Wiley reported that Stilers LED reached out to discuss the options to update the lighting around town. He also stated that he spoke with Ben Shannon about possible updates to our website.
- Dustin Lantz was present to discuss Old Settlers. He will work with the Public Works Department to implement the street closures. The carnival will be in town starting Thursday, June 25th, and they requested to set up campers in the carnival area. Kurt Ganoe will dig the pit for mud volleyball. Heather Godwin-Pote will provide the net.
- Joan Wetrich asked whether any action would be taken regarding her neighbor's property. Council confirmed that the matter is currently in litigation.
- Larry Moone expressed concern about the property at 702 2nd Street behind him, stating that it is not being kept mowed. He also noted that at the corner property, bushes are encroaching on the sidewalk. Code Enforcement will send out letters.
- Jim Holwegner introduced himself as the President of the Redfield Redfield Development Corporation.
- **Resolution 10-2026** Stonehocker moved to approve Resolution 10-2026, and L. Paardekooper seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- **Resolution 11-2026** L. Paardekooper moved to approve Resolution 11-2026, and Stonehocker seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- **Resolution 12-2026** Meyers moved to approve Resolution 12-2026, and Roberts seconded. Zeransky, Roberts, Meyers, and Stonehocker voted aye. L. Paardekooper abstained.
- **Resolution 13-2026** Meyers moved to approve Resolution 13-2026, and Stonehocker seconded. Zeransky, Roberts, Meyers, and Stonehocker voted aye. L. Paardekooper abstained.
- Meyers moved to approve the liquor and tobacco licenses, and Stonehocker seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- A flyer will be made to recruit members for the Planning and Zoning and Board of Adjustments committees.
- Mayor Wiley made a suggestion to change the Council meeting dates and times. This will be discussed at the next meeting.
- Stonehocker moved to adjourn, and Meyers seconded. The meeting adjourned at 8:18 P.M.

Redfield City Council Special Meeting — June 23, 2026

The City of Redfield held a special meeting on Tuesday, June 23rd, 2026. The meeting was called to order at 6:08 p.m.

Present were Council Members L. Paardekooper, S. Roberts, K. Zeransky, and V. Stonehocker; Public Works Director T. Clausen; Mayor Wiley; and Clerk K. Paardekooper. T. Meyers arrived at 6:30 p.m.

- Visitor Robert Greenway discussed the census and suggested that the City conduct another census. He also discussed LOSST revenue and how it can help the community.
- Ben Shannon attended via Zoom and presented options for a new website. He offered to create a home page for Council to better review the design. Council will wait to see the home page before making a decision. This will be discussed at the July council meeting.
- A seasonal part-time position was discussed to assist the Public Works Department. S. Roberts motioned to hire a seasonal part-time person. K. Zeransky seconded. All ayes.
- A flyer to attract volunteers for the Board of Adjustments and the Planning and Zoning Committee was reviewed. L. Paardekooper motioned to approve the flyer. T. Meyers seconded. All ayes.
- Review of the personnel policy was tabled until the next meeting.
- Janon Douglas reached out and offered her services to Clerk K. Paardekooper. She charges \$50 per hour. Council requested that Clerk K. Paardekooper determine how many hours would be needed for assistance. This topic was tabled until the next meeting.
- Resolution 2026-14, Authorizing Changes to Library Bank Account Signatories, was presented. T. Meyers motioned to approve. V. Stonehocker seconded. Roll call vote: all ayes.
- Resolution 2026-15, Amending the Current Budget for the Fiscal Year ending June 2026. V. Stonehocker moved and S. Roberts seconded. Roll call vote – all ayes.
- Resolution 2026-16, Establishing the Date and Time of Regular Council Meetings, was presented. V. Stonehocker motioned to approve. T. Meyers seconded. Roll call vote: all ayes.
- Resolution 2026-17, Establishing Payroll Periods and Pay Dates, was presented. T. Meyers motioned to approve. V. Stonehocker seconded. Roll call vote: all ayes.
- Resolution 2025-06 was entered incorrectly in 2025. A new resolution will be drafted for review at the next meeting.
- A liquor license extension for The Dexfield Diner for Old Settlers was presented. K. Zeransky motioned to approve. L. Paardekooper seconded. All ayes. S. Roberts recused.
- CB Solar had applied for a variance for solar panels at the Co-op. This had previously been denied. Clerk K. Paardekooper will reach out to let them know they are able to reapply.
- Hero banners were discussed. Council decided to show its support for the Redfield Fire and EMS departments. A quote was received from Display Sales for 15 banners. If more than 15 banners are needed, the Redfield Fire and EMS will fund the remaining banners. T. Meyers motioned to approve. S. Roberts seconded. All ayes.
- Vendor permits for Old Settlers will be handled by the Old Settlers Committee.
- There was concern about fencing for events where alcohol is served. Clerk K. Paardekooper will reach out to the City Attorney to determine whether a new ordinance is needed or whether the current ordinance can be amended.

With no further business, S. Roberts motioned to adjourn. L. Paardekooper seconded. All ayes. The meeting adjourned at 7:53 p.m.

Garden Tasks for July

It's time for harvest! As vegetables begin to produce, be sure to check them regularly so they don't rot on the vine, or get eaten by pests. Rotten fruit can attract pests and disease. I pick most vegetables every other day during peak harvest.

- Seeds can continue to be sown throughout July for late crops of beets, bush beans, carrots, corn, Swiss chard, cucumbers and summer squash. Covering with premoistened potting soil mix will make it less likely for the soil crust over before they emerge. Covering with a thin layer of mulch will help preserve moisture.
- Start seeds now for cold weather crops in your fall garden. This would include broccoli, cauliflower, collards, kale, etc. Radish, carrots, beets, turnips and kale can be direct sown in late July and August.
- Remove diseased foliage to prevent spread. Dying and diseased leaves are the major source of pathogens in the garden. If you leave blight-covered squash or tomato leaves to rot at the base of your plants, you can create problems for years to come. Just a few minutes of garden clean up can make a difference for disease prevention. Carry a trash bag to gather infected leaves, so it does not get scattered in the garden. Be sure to wash your hands and any tools used in the process before using in other parts of the garden.
- Harvest onions and garlic as the tops dry and fall over. Braid garlic tops and store in a cool dry place. Cut onion tops back to one inch and dry thoroughly before storing. Use any damaged produce first.
- Pinch back herbs and flowers for a bushier plant and greater production.
- Make the most of summer harvests by preserving crops. Freezing, sun-drying, dehydrating, picking and canning are just a few of the tasty ways to make your summer abundance last through winter.
- Garden flowers, whether annuals or perennials, benefit from deadheading after flowering. Removing the spent flower heads allows more energy to produce more flowers or foliage and roots.
- Divide and transplant bearded iris using the vigorous ends of the rhizomes. Discard the old center portion. Cut the leaves back to about 6 inches.
- Check the soil moisture of container-grown flowers (and vegetables) daily. Fertilize once a week while watering.
- Control mosquitos by eliminating sources of standing water. Consider installing a bat house to encourage bats – they eat mosquitos.

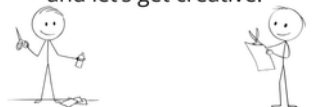

Approval of minutes from 3/25/2026: It was moved by Lang to approve the corrected minutes of the March 25 meeting. Second by Moone. Approved by all.

Approval of Agenda for 4/29/2026: Moone moved to approve the agenda. Second by Lang. Approved by all.

Financial Report: Discussion was held about the value of the Infomax contract. It was moved by Wilson to not renew the contract. Second by Moone. Approved.

It was noted that a few of the budget item amounts presented by the city does not match the library director's numbers.

It was moved by Lang to pay outstanding bills totaling \$4591.03. Second by Moone. Approved.

Progress and Service Reports:

- Library Director Kuonen reported that the door count was 312 in March. There were 370 checkouts. The patron computers were used 42 times and we had 120 wireless connections to our public internet. Twenty-three programs were offered in March with 106 participants.
- Community surveys are being picked up but very few have been returned. The survey will be used to help with the creation of the new Strategic Plan. Kuonen will contact our new state library rep, Misty Gray to get her input in the process of creating a Strategic Plan. This will be worked on at the next meeting.
- A few families came to Easter crafts at the library on April 4.
- On April 16, Trustee Chairwoman Julia Swallow and Director Ashley Kuonen attended the Dallas County Foundation and Go Green County grant ceremony where the library was presented with the donation of \$2200 from the foundation to expand the STEM programming at our library.
- Adult Craft Night had only one participant, but several people are interested, so we are expecting this program to grow. Future Adult Craft Night will be the third Wednesday of every month.
- March Storytime had 2 guest readers with the first story Mother Bruce, with a craft of Mother Bruce and the Goslings. The second read was Diary of a Worm and learning about earthworms. This was followed by making a snack of dirt cups complete with worms.
- Master Gardener Program called Big Dream, Small Spaces: The art of small space gardening was presented. Each gardener went home with a free bottle of plant spray to keep fruit flies/gnats away.
- For National Library Week (April 19-25) there was a scavenger hunt at the library, and any Redfield Library patron who showed their library card at Dexfield Diner and Pub received a 10% discount off their order.
- Jumbo Magnatiles and large sensory colorful liquid floor tiles have been borrowed from the State Library for use by the youngest patrons and caregivers for the next few weeks.
- We have received lots of positive feedback on the new seating area. It is getting use by patrons of all ages. More fun has been added to the children's area with the purchase of an Aldi checkout play center.
- Our baby changing table and outdoor bulletin board were installed this month and have already been put to use.

The Raccoon River Valley Trail at the Redfield Depot

The Depot is open!! There are no more train wheels click-clacking along on the tracks. The wheels rolling these days are of a quieter nature and not quite as business oriented as the train wheels were, especially after the trains going through Redfield no longer served passengers starting in the 1950's, but were solely freight trains. As we opened the Redfield Depot in May of this year for another summer several of us involved were struck by how fortunate Redfield is to still have this remnant of history and to be able to integrate it into our lives today. So much has changed!

The RRVT owner/operators, the Dallas County Conservation Board, along with Redfield volunteers back in 1989 opened in Redfield as part of the initial RRVT stretching 34 miles from Waukee to Yale. Today the RRVT stretches more than twice that far from Waukee to Jefferson, has a loop inside of it and is connected to other trails, making for great bicycling opportunities here in central Iowa. From May to October today's Redfield Depot volunteers are still greeting riders, conversing with them, selling drinks and home-made cookies. One thing that has changed this year is the price of the cookies - now \$.50! Valid opinions on both sides of that decision making process, whether to raise the price from \$.25 to \$.50, were heard and as the result of an interesting discussion this was the outcome! One caveat was agreed upon, that any rider who signs in with their name and home location, will get one free cookie! (That actually is significant information for us, knowing where our guest riders come from so it's a winner for both parties!)

So, speaking of volunteers at the Depot, we hope that some of you reading this may be interested in finding out more about it and how to take part - it is a fun volunteer opportunity. You can volunteer also by being one of our bakers of cookies - the ones we now sell for \$.50!
