Free Athletic Physicals and vaccines: As back to school time approaches Redfield Medical Clinic continues to offer free Athletic Physicals for those youngsters with no health insurance or who are under-insured. Regarding immunizations vaccinations are much safer than getting the illnesses shots prevent. Cold packs and numbing medication can be used to ease the discomfort of vaccinations. Sadly, two Texas youngsters died of measles last year. Measles virus is highly contagious. Measles vaccine is 97% effective at preventing the measles infection. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Cyclosporiasis: can cause "explosive" diarrhea. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) it is caused by a microscopic parasite that infects the small intestine causing a watery diarrhea. Multiple states are having out breaks recently, including Michigan and Ohio. . Cyclospora can cause cramping, nausea, vomiting and low grade fever, too. The illness has been linked to imported raspberries, snow peas, basil, lettuce and cilantro. Symptoms usually occur 2 days to 2 weeks after exposure feces contaminated food or water. Healthy individuals usually recover in several days to a week without treatment. The organism can be detected by stool culture but may require several samples to find. Persistent case can be treated with a Bactrim antibiotic for 10 days. To minimize the chances of Cyclospora infection cut away any damaged parts of produce, wash thoroughly with tap water and keep refrigerated. Of course, wash hands with soap and water prior to handling produce.

Meyers, Code Enforcer J. LaBarge, Librarian Kuonen and Clerk K. Paardekooper. Mayor Wiley and Councilman V. Stonehocker were absent.

- O. Meyers was present to give the Fire and EMS report. There were 3 Fire calls, 7 EMS calls and 2 calls for Fire and EMS. For a total of 12 calls, zero billable to Linden.
- Dallas County Sheriff's Office reported 80 hours of patrol and 12 hours on calls for a total of 92 hours.
- PW Director T. Clausen discussed the city brush pile. Clerk K. Paardekooper will look into a "no commercial use" sign to post in the area. A complaint regarding a sewer blockage was discussed. Upon investigation, it was determined that the blockage was caused by rags that had been flushed into the sewer system. Pictures were provided to council. The source of the rags is believed to have been identified. Attorney D. Schlagel will review whether fines or other remedies may be available. Also presented were 2 bids for road work. These will be reviewed later.
- No Zoning report. There has been a vacancy for the Zoning Administrator. L. Paardekooper motioned to posting an opening for this position, K. Zeransky seconded. Motion passed unanimously. Clerk K. Paardekooper will submit the ad to the paper. Members are still needed to fill positions in the Board of Adjustments and the Planning and Zoning Committees. A flyer was created and will be sent to the Redfield Review for next months publication.

● REDFIELD CITY COUNCIL - CONT.

- Code Enforcement Officer J. LaBarge reported forty-six courtesy letters were sent. The property at 910 Grant is still in litigation, however, it should be resolved by the end of the month. The property at 628 First Street is also still in litigation. No updates had been received at the time of the meeting.
- Mary Barker expressed concerns regarding a courtesy letter she received. The Council acknowledged the progress she has made over the years and encouraged her to continue communicating with the Code Enforcement Officer regarding future property improvements.
- Joanne Wetrich asked about electric scooters and explained her concern. Attorney Schlagel will look into an ordinance.
- Linda Lantz with the Redfield Development was present to ask about painting the playground equipment at the park. She was looking into sand blasting the equipment to prep it for painting, but, was concerned about the mess it would create. L. Paardekooper commented that there is new sandblasting method, with dry ice, there is no mess. He will look into it and let Linda know. She also questioned if this is something that the City would be able to financially assist with. Clerk K. Paardekooper will look into the funds that are available.
- Library Director Kuonen reported that the door count was 431, the patron computers were used 49 times and there were 158 wireless connections to the public internet. Over all for FY 25/26 they offered 227 programs and had 1074 participants.
- Clerk K. Paardekooper would like to attend the classes, September 23-25. S. Roberts motioned to approve, K. Zeransky seconded. Motion passed unanimously.
- Resolution 2026-18-Permit fees for sound equipment was tabled.
- Ordinance 2025-04-Fireworks, was reviewed and confirmed that it is current and correct. No change needed.
- Ordinance 2025-05-Right of Way, was also reviewed and confirmed that it is current and correct. No change needed.
- Ordinance 2026-02-Recognition Program, K. Zeransky motioned to forgo the second and third readings and adopt, L. Paardekooper seconded. Roll call vote, L. Paardekooper, K. Zeransky, S. Roberts and T. Meyers, all Ayes. V. Stonehocker absent. Motion carried. S. Roberts motioned to approve Ordinance 2026-02, L. Paardekooper seconded. Motion carried.
- Resolution 2026-19-Honorary Recognition, S. Roberts motion to approve, K. Zeransky seconded. All Ayes, motion carried
- Resolution 2026-20-Personnel Policies and Procedures-S. Roberts motioned to approve, K. Zeransky seconded. All Ayes, motion carried.
- An updated Right of Way permit application was presented. After review L. Paardekooper motioned to approve the new permit, K. Zeransky seconded. All Ayes. Clerk K. Paardekooper will send the new application to Windstream to complete for approval.
- Discussion regarding Safe Routes to School (TEAP), grant opportunities, and Sitler's LED proposal was tabled until the next meeting.
- Clerk K. Paardekooper requested a stipend of \$50/month for the Mayor for the use of his cell phone. Attorney Schlagel will look into this to see if it is an option.
- Dr. Ed Friedmann with The Redfield Medical Clinic, was present to discuss The Rural Health Initiative. He was requesting that the council approve letters to be sent to our Senators and Representatives to help pass HR5199. L. Paardekooper motioned to approve the letters, K. Zeransky seconded. Motion passed unanimously. Mayor Wiley has written the letters and will send them out.
- V & K reached out to request an update on their proposals from January. Council will do further review and table the matter till next meeting.
- Ben Shannon visited via Zoom. He presented a mock home page of what a new website for Redfield could look like. The Council thanked him for his time and they will discuss and review.
- PW Director T. Clausen will reach out to the applicants for the seasonal position. Council has authorized him to make the decision, as this person will report directly to him.

With no further business. L. Paardekooper motioned to adjourn, K. Zeransky seconded. All Ayes. Meeting adjourned at 7:40 P.M.

- Discussion was held regarding the website proposal from Modern Edge Agency. L. Paardekooper motioned to accept Option 2, rebuild and stabilize. K. Zeransky seconded. Motion carried, all ayes.

● REDFIELD CITY COUNCIL SPECIAL MEETING CONT.

- L. Paardekooper motioned to approve Resolution 2026-18, Permit Fees for Sound Equipment. K. Zeransky seconded. Roll call vote, Ayes, L. Paardekooper, K. Zeransky, S. Roberts. Nays: none. T. Meyers and V. Stonehocker, absent. Motion carried.
- Resolution 2026-21, Noise Ordinance Amendment, was tabled.
- Resolution 2026-22, Garbage Rates, was tabled.
- Discussion regarding attendance at the Iowa League of Cities Annual Conference was tabled.
- A lighting quote from Sitrler's LED was received and discussed. The rebates being offered were determined to be beneficial to the City. S. Roberts motioned to approve the quote. L. Paardekooper seconded. Motion carried, all ayes. Council would like to see the project start with the City Shed.
- The Council discussed the many grants available and determined which would be most beneficial to the community. Mayor Wiley would like to form committees to head up each grant.
- L. Paardekooper motioned to apply for the Wastewater and Drinking Water Treatment Financial Assistance Program (WTFAP), Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Water/Sewer/Stormwater Fund, and USDA Water & Waste Disposal Loan and Grant Program. K. Zeransky seconded. Motion carried, all ayes.
- K. Zeransky motioned to apply for the Traffic Engineering Assistance Program (TEAP) and the Transportation Alternatives Program (Safe Routes to School). S. Roberts seconded. Motion carried, all ayes.
- The Redfield Development Corporation suggested that the Council investigate the Rural Housing Readiness Assessment Grant. L. Paardekooper motioned to research this opportunity. S. Roberts seconded. Motion carried, all ayes.
- Discussion of Fire and EMS grants was tabled until additional information can be gathered.
- An employee requested to cash out currently accrued comp time. S. Roberts motioned to approve the request. L. Paardekooper seconded. Motion carried, all ayes. Clerk K. Paardekooper will work with Attorney Schlagel to change the wording in the handbook and create a resolution for next meeting.
- K. Zeransky brought forward a complaint regarding parking. However, by the time of the meeting, the vehicle in question had been moved. The Council agreed that future concerns of this nature should be directed to the Code Enforcer.

THEME 1

Goals include developing a cohesive community brand built around our trail, river, and history -- clarifying roles between the City, RDC, and Chamber so efforts do not overlap -- building a leadership pipeline that brings in new and younger voices -- and improving outreach through a community-wide contact list, social media calendar, and regular public updates.

Housing, Infrastructure & Land Use Planning

Redfield is growing faster than the state average and that growth is not slowing down. We need housing supply, infrastructure, and planning tools to keep pace before growth outpaces us. Goals include a multi-year Capital Improvement Program for utilities and streets -- applying for a Rural

Housing Readiness Assessment Grant to understand our housing gaps -- reviewing and updating zoning regulations -- and pursuing state and federal infrastructure funding through CDBG, Iowa's State Revolving Fund, and USDA Rural Development programs.

THEME 3

Economic Development & Business Growth

The businesses already here are Redfield's strongest economic asset. On average, 80% of investment and job growth in a community comes from existing businesses. Goals include building a database of available commercial and industrial properties so we can respond quickly when developers come calling -- participating in a Business Retention and Expansion program through the Greater Dallas County Development Alliance -- and developing a social media presence that signals to the outside world that Redfield is open, active, and worth investing in.

Community Assets, Quality of Life & Placemaking

- Continue to harvest your vegetables, checking for developed fruits. Regular harvesting encourages more production and helps to avoid woody or bitter produce.
- It's time to use recipes you've compiled for your crops. Try canning or freezing your produce. Make jellies and jams, or a loaf of prized zucchini bread or a casserole. It's also a nice gesture to share some of your harvest with family, friends, neighbors or your local food pantry.
- Weeding, fertilizing, pruning, mulching, and watering when needed will help keep your garden thriving and productive in the heat of summer.
- If you weed your garden regularly, the less likely they will have the opportunity to go to seed and propagate further.
- Mulching helps regulate soil temperature, cool plant roots, retain soil moisture and deter weeds. Keep mulch on hand for when bare spots open up in the garden.
- Any new fruits on tomato plants, pumpkin plants and other large vegetable plants that develop at the end of the month won't have time to ripen, so cull them and any flowers so the plant can put its energy in growing and ripening the already established fruits. Prune tomato suckers, peppers and eggplant to encourage new growth.
- Prune squash plants if their foliage is overlapping other plants.
- Trim back herbs or pinch off flowering tips to prevent the plant from going to seed and to prolong your harvest.
- Vegetables are heavy feeders and have been working hard to produce this summer so a side dressing of compost or fertilizer will bolster your crop.
- Stay vigilant to protect your garden from pests such as cabbage worms and aphids. Check plants regularly. Use barriers or hand pick pests. A strong spray of water can dislodge aphids.
- If you get a heat wave, some cool weather plants may start to flower prematurely. Keep them well watered, and use shade cloth if necessary to cool them down.
- Direct seed leafy greens, lettuce, radishes, and peas in succession for fall harvest. Turnips, beets and carrots can be planted now. For carrots, use shorter season varieties such as Nantes, Little Finger or Parisienne. You will need transplants for broccoli and cauliflower.
- Just a reminder that you can find free seeds at your local Dallas County Library or at Dallas County Extension Office, provided by the Dallas County Master Gardeners.
- Pinch off flowers of coleus plants to encourage a fuller plant with more foliage.
- Deadhead flowering annuals and perennials, collecting seeds from the best plants.
- Container plants and hanging baskets may require daily watering because the heat can dry them quickly. Always allow the soil to dry before watering. Don't forget to add fertilizer to the water once a week.
- Shrubs should not be pruned at this point of the season, unless it is to remove dead or damaged limbs.
- Avoid fertilizing shrubs and trees now as the resulting push of new growth may not thrive well as frost dates loom in the not-too-distant future.
- Start choosing the fall planted bulbs for spring color.
- Don't forget about the pollinators in your fall garden. There will be fewer flowering plants in the garden as the season changes. Consider planting another round of marigolds, cosmos, calendula, sunflowers, zinnias and other fall blooming annuals to encourage beneficial pollinators to the garden.

Approval of minutes from 4/29 /2026: It was moved by Moone to approve the corrected minutes of the April meeting. Second by Lang.

Approved by all.

Approval of Agenda for 5/27/2026: Moone moved to approve the agenda. Second by Lang. Approved by all.

Financial Report: Budget was approved as it had been submitted. State and county money had been errantly going into the trust account, but that stopped shortly after our director came on board. The state money we did receive is not showing up on the State Revenue line item on our Revenue and Expense Report where it is supposed go and it has been addressed at the city office but that they were unsure how to fix it at this time. The funds in the original savings library trust are up in the air right now.. This is being looked in to, and we don't know at this time how it will be resolved.

It was moved by Moone to pay outstanding bills totaling \$3252.21. Second by Lang. Approved.

Progress and Service Reports:

- Library Director Kuonen reported that the door count was 288 in April. There were 344 checkouts. The patron computers were used 42 times and we had 120 wireless connections to our public internet. Seventeen programs were offered in April with 59 participants.
- Master Gardener program on Landscape Design had a lot of great information with small attendance.
- Adult Craft Night was well attended, and we look forward to more fun craft nights to come.
- The State of Iowa Library has acknowledged that our library met the standards for Tier 3 accreditation and starting July 1, 2026 will receive Tier 3 funding. We will need to renew our tier status in February of 2029, which will expire July 2029.
- The "trust account" for library future planning that is under the city and separate from the library operating budget was created. Resolution No 2026-08 was created for that account that explains the parameters of that account and how it is used. It was approved at the May city council meeting. We now have a place to put future funds the library receives and can set goals on how we plan to use those funds to better the library.
- We received paperwork from the law firm working with the Norma Jean Warner trust. The forms were completed and we will receive a memorial donation of \$941.69.
- The \$1000 matching funds required from the Dallas County Foundation grant will not be spent until after the current fiscal year, as makerspace is currently on back order. We have until October to make the purchase.
- Upcoming events: Summer Reading Program! The kick off is June 3rd. There are already 8 participants signed up for the teen program (Fuel and Flavor).
- July 29th- Retracing the Dragoon Trail at 6:30 pm

Unfinished business

- State Library of Iowa District Representative Misty Gray went over the process to work on the strategic plan. Trustees are to compile a list of community names at the next meeting, and Misty will interview those who are willing, in order to find out community needs. She will return in August to discuss the responses.
- There is no update on the Finance Policy.
- Little Free Library –After discussion as to its purpose and appearance, Lang moved to ask the city if the Little Free Library can be moved to the City Park. If they do not want it, get rid of it. Second by Moone. Approved.
- PTO – look at city policy.
- By Laws – Verified change was made at meeting in May, 2025.

New Business

- Alcohol Policy – We need to check with city council about alcohol brought into building as this is a child friendly place. Misty advised to check with insurance company.
- Library Sale – Moone moved that Director Kuonen can sell books and furniture as she best determines. Second by Lang. Approved by all.
- Trustee Continuing Ed training was replaced with the strategic planning session.

July Recap – Local Highlights

Adel & Dallas County
