Redfield Clinic News

For older folks and youngsters now back at school and everyone in between here is how to increase chances of keeping your brain healthy.

To support your overall brain function and mental well being employ the SWEET acronym: Sleep, Water, Exercise, Education and Time.

Sleep: Sufficient sleep is crucial for proper memory formation, waste removal from the brain and thinking clearly. Most of us need at least 7-8 hours of quality sleep in a dark, quiet and cool room and a comfortable bed. Younger children need at least 8-10 hours of sleep.

Water: Drinking enough water helps our brain work more efficiently and makes for a good mood. Together with sufficient water a brain healthy diet such as the Mediterranean or MIND diets strengthen and protect the brain. That means avoiding highly processed foods with long lists of artificial ingredients and eating fruits, vegetables, whole grains and lean protein close to the way mother nature made it.

Exercise: Daily strength building physical exercise improves clear thinking and the growth of new brain cells and connections. Exercise decreases inflammation and improves blood flow to the brain. The key is finding an exercise you like and doing it.

Education: Lifelong learning keeps the brain sharp and can delay cognitive decline. Learning new things strengthens and increases connections in the brain that are key to improving the brain's ability to handle challenges and prevent or delay cognitive decline. It is a good idea to aim to learn some thing new every day.

Time in nature: Going outside in natural environments reduces stress and improves mental health. Stress is part of life but the way you handle it significantly affects your health. Chronic stress can impair your memory, increase the risk of mental illness and even affect the structure of your brain. Stress can be managed by meditation and setting realistic expectations.

Measles outbreak: Already 16 cases of measles have been confirmed in Iowa by the state health department so far this year. Measles is a highly contagious viral illness that is spread through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It's incubation period is usually 7-14 days. Symptoms of the measles include fever, cough, red and watery eyes, runny nose and a red rash. One of five individuals with the measles are hospitalized. Complications include pneumonia, swelling of the brain and sometimes death. Sadly, last year 3 children died of the measles. Measles is 97% preventable with the MMR vaccine (measles, mumps and rubella).

Free immunizations are available at the Redfield Clinic through federally funded Vaccines for Children (VFC) program for those youngsters less than 19 years of age without health insurance or those who are under insured. Free athletic physicals are offered for those without health insurance who are Redfield Clinic patients or students at West Central Valley school district.

Food borne illnesses, including cyclospora and salmonella contamination of fresh produce, have spiked recently. These diseases are characterized by nausea, vomiting and diarrhea after eating contaminated food. Cuts in federal funding and inspectors for early detection and prevention of food borne illnesses by Elon Musk's Dept. of Government Efficiency (DOGE) have put us all at increased risk for these diseases. Consider asking candidates for public office during this election season to restore these food safe guards.

Thank you to Redfield Mayor Michael Wiley and the Redfield City Council members and the many individuals wrote our US senators and our US Congressman Zach Nunn in support of a bill allowing PAs & NPs to operate Rural Health Clinics like our in Redfield. And thank you to Congressman Nunn who has now cosponsored the bill, H.R. 5199.

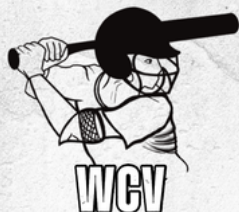

- Fire Chief Short reported 2 Fire calls, 10 EMS calls, and 1 Fire/EMS call for a total of 13 calls. He also noted that the emergency tornado siren test will move to the first Wednesday of each month at 11:00 a.m., beginning in January 2027.
- The Dallas County Sheriff's Office reported 92 hours of patrol and 8 hours on calls.
- Public Works Director Clausen reported complaints of red water near Second Street and Jefferson Street. The discoloration was caused by a pressure differential that disturbed naturally occurring iron sediment in the water system. This can happen after water main breaks and during times of increased seasonal water use. Public Works will conduct targeted flushing in the area to improve water quality.

● REDFIELD CITY COUNCIL - CONT.

- A seasonal worker has been hired. Council discussed whether the seasonal hiring process should begin earlier next year. It was agreed that the application process should begin in April. Public Works Technician Hodson will be taking water distribution classes beginning in September. A water leak at 901 Clark Street was promptly repaired. Road bids were tabled.
- Code Enforcer LaBarge submitted his report. The property at 904 1st Street was discussed. Various viewpoints were presented, and the item was tabled for future consideration. Council Member S. Roberts departed the meeting following discussion of this agenda item.
- Library Board President Swallow presented a letter requesting removal of the Little Free Library located in front of the library. T. Meyers moved to remove the Little Free Library. K. Zeransky seconded. All ayes. Motion carried.
- The box will be repurposed at City Hall to replace the existing Blessing Box and will continue to serve as a Blessing Box for the community.
- T. Meyers inquired about the Storybook Walk at New Ireland Park. Library Board President Swallow was unaware of the Library's involvement with the project. She will review the matter with the Board at its next meeting and report back to the Council.
- A request for benefits for the Library Director will be reviewed.
- The West Central Valley After Prom Committee requested permission to conduct a donation drive at the Four Corners on Saturday, August 29th, to raise funds for the After Prom event. K. Zeransky moved to approve the request. L. Paardekooper seconded. All ayes. Motion carried.
- Tire Day is scheduled for Saturday, August 29th, from 8:00 a.m. to noon.
- Mayor Wiley received an email from MIPA regarding grants that may be available to the community. The Mayor would like to establish committees to pursue these opportunities.
- Lighting has been ordered for the City Shed project.
- An update was provided on the City's website project. Progress is continuing with Modern Edge Agency in the development of the new website.
- A draft letter was submitted to MIPA for the TEAP grant.
- Matt Coffin addressed the Council regarding a nuisance notification letter he received concerning a dresser placed at the curb for garbage collection. Mayor Wiley acknowledged that the notice had been sent in error and apologized for the mistake.
- Heather Pote expressed concerns regarding the condition and maintenance of New Ireland Park, stating that the park is overgrown and not being adequately maintained. Public Works Director Clausen addressed the concerns. Discussion included maintenance responsibilities for the park and the Storybook Walk. Mayor Wiley, Public Works Director Clausen, and the Park Committee will meet to discuss the matter further.
- Joanne Wetrich expressed concerns regarding the condition of the area around the flagpole at the Post Office. The matter will be forwarded to Code Enforcement.
- Resolution 2026-21, Personnel Policy Update

- Employee reviews were tabled due to a lack of quorum.
- A donation request was received from the WCV Booster Club. A donation of \$100 was approved in the past. T. Meyers moved to donate \$100. L. Paardekooper seconded. All ayes. Motion carried.
- K. Zeransky moved to approve L. Paardekooper's attendance at the Iowa League of Cities Annual Conference. T. Meyers seconded. L. Paardekooper abstained. Motion carried.

There being no further business, T. Meyers moved to adjourn. L. Paardekooper seconded. Motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 7:58 p.m.

THE REDFIELD DEPOT ON THE RACCOON RIVER VALLEY TRAIL

The good news we are all enjoying now at the depot, along with other ventures in town welcoming bike traffic from east of us (like the Saturday morning breakfast at the Legion Hall) is that THE BRIDGE IS BACK! The repair to the old railroad bridge on the east side of Adel, is complete. The original renovation on the now lighted bridge as a part of the RRVT, was almost complete when vandalism this spring was responsible for the fire causing even more extensive (and expensive) work needing to be done on the bridge which has taken most of this summer. The reopening and ribbon cutting for the iconic bridge, was held on August 21st and included a community bike ride from Waukee to Adel to celebrate the return of this key connection for trail users.

Relatively nice weather in August has brought people to the Redfield Depot from many locations. The new policy of offering riders a free cookie if they sign in has resulted in getting more signatures in our guest book and the chance to visit with them in the process. Several mid-western folks describe how they have found the trail by word of mouth or on bicycle maps and they make a week-end trip to the trail – often doing it along with the High Trestle Trail, connected to the RRVT, and staying a night or two in the areas they visit.

An interesting group from the College of DuPage, (CoD) located in an outer suburban Chicago area, passed through one Sunday afternoon – they had stayed in Perry the night before. As a community college, CoD offers field studies including travel to such interesting places as Turkey, Alaska – - and the RRVT in central Iowa! They stopped and enjoyed chatting with our volunteers, and having a cookie before heading out towards their destination, Waukee. They talked about how they were enjoying the “ruralness” of the trail – crops, farmsteads, and the small towns connecting them.

We will be open for two more months, (Sept and Oct) eventually reducing the number of daily hours to four on each week-end day as school activities start and the weather cools down. If you are interested in volunteering, use the contact numbers below to get more information.

GARDEN TASKS

Garden Tasks for September

- Walk around your garden and make note of high performing and underwhelming plant varieties. Put your favorites on a list to buy or save some of their seeds for next year.
- Remove any female flowers or immature fruits from squash, tomato, melons, pumpkins and eggplants as they have little chance of maturing at this point in the season. Pinching them off will push the energy to fruits that are established.
- Remove leaves, stems, fruit and plant parts after the first frost. Most vegetable plants have disease or pest on them. Fall garden clean-up will reduce disease and insects in next year's garden. Composting is a good way to get rid of plants, but your compost pile must reach a temperature of 140 degrees to kill pathogens. Another option is burning if it is legal.
- Fall tillage provides several benefits. It is a good time to add rotted manure, compost leaves and disease-free garden waste. A fall tilled garden warms up more quickly in the spring.
- Another way to prevent garden disease is to make note of where things are planted this year, and rotate them to another portion of the garden next year.
- If you are planting a cover crop, now is the time to get seeds and start planting.
- Do not prune trees and shrubs in the fall. Wait until February or March to do your pruning.
- Now is a good time to check garden centers for the best selection of spring flowering bulbs.
- It is a great time to divide perennials like hostas, daylilies, shasta daisies, etc.
- Perennials do not need to be clear cut after the first freeze. Leaving the foliage, stems and seed heads provide an extra layer of protection for the root system, and helps provide food for wildlife and beneficial insects. If perennials are diseased or insect ridden, or if they are overgrown it is best to remove the plant material.
- Dig tubers of gladiolus, dahlias, cannas, caladiums and store them for the winter.
- Late summer is the best time to start a new lawn. Sow grass seed through September. It is also a good time to plant perennials and shrubs that you want to add to your landscape.
- Houseplants that have been outdoors should come in when the nighttime temperatures are consistently around 50 degrees. This is usually mid to late September. It is best to gradually transition them to indoor living.
- Check for insects (and toads) before bringing houseplants inside, and keep them isolated from other plants for 3-4 weeks. I had a toad hiding in one of my pots last year, but spotted it before it came in. Place plants in bright indirect light indoors as they adjust to being indoors.

Approval of minutes from 5/27/2026: It was moved by Moone to approve the corrected minutes of the May meeting. Second by Lang. Approved by all.

Approval of Agenda for 6/24/2026: Lang moved to approve the agenda. Second by Moone. Approved by all.

Financial Report: It was moved by Wilson to pay outstanding bills totaling \$4828.01. Second by Lang. Approved.

Progress and Service Reports:

- Library Director Kuonen reported that the door count was 259 in May. There were 344 checkouts. Eighty-eight reference questions were answered. The patron computers were used 44 times and we had 112 wireless connections to our public internet. Sixteen programs were offered in May with 64 participants.
- Summer reading program kicked off on June 3 with 30 participants. There were 2 kid programs with Dallas County Master Gardeners. The smoothie bike program was a big hit. Participants learned about different plants parts and what part of each type of fruit and vegetable we eat. They then created their own recipes and blended their own smoothies by pedaling the smoothie bike. We have hosted a popcorn bar and movie day, created insect hotels and bird feeders, painted terra cotta pots for Adult Craft Night and got to experience the Fantastic Foam and More science show by Absolute Science. We also had PBS STEAM trailer for a week and were able to rotate different STEAM stations throughout the library for the week. The Fuel and Flavor teen program has one final class. The participants have learned a lot about kitchen hygiene and kitchen safety as well as working as a team. They have been reading recipes and creating lots of great dishes.
- Upcoming: The Summer Reading Program will still be making homemade ice cream, doing Art in the Park and a balloon artist at Old Settlers, painting kindness rocks, and a garden salsa making night with the smoothie bake before the end on the Summer Reading Program with a party and prizes on July 8. Library cards and Facebook likes will be promoted during Old Settlers. Retracing the Dragoon Trail with Kevin Mason will be July 29 at 6:30 pm

REDFIELD DEVELOPMENT MEETING MINUTES -Aug. 17, 2026

Jim Holwegner called the meeting to order at 6pm.

Present: Jim Holwegner, Kristy Zeransky, Ryan McAtee, Shane Murphy, Pam Danielson, Linda Lantz. Ben Shannon attended remotely.

Guests: Heather Pote presented two items to the board. First, an annual sponsorship request for the West Central Valley Booster Club. Second, a request for RDC to serve as fiscal sponsor for the Redfield Senior Citizens Home so it can pursue grants requiring 501(c)(3) status. See New Business for details.

Guests: Tammy Snyder, former manager of the Redfield Senior Citizens Home, attended in support of the fiscal sponsorship discussion.

REPORTS

July Meeting Minutes - Minutes were not available for review at the meeting. Approval carried to September.

Treasurer's Report - Ryan gave the report. Old Settlers account quiet; two checks issued (advertising and \$375 to Barnyard Buddies for the petting zoo). Chamber account received deposits from Zeffy, Redfield Medical Clinic (\$240 for one full year of Redfield Review advertising at \$20/month), and the \$300 monthly agency fee. Corporation Checking issued two checks: Linda Lantz (plates reimbursement) and Sandy Selby (fence posts); firefighter groceries payment (Jim Eide) remains pending. New \$25,000 6-month Corporation CD opened, earning \$68.84 in interest this month, compounding monthly. Savings balance at \$7,680 following a \$15,905 withdrawal for the cashier shed (plus \$5 fee). All approved report.

OLD BUSINESS

Bank Account Authorization

Cristin's removal from RDC accounts confirmed per July action. Jim to be re-added so he can write checks. Ryan to process.

Iowa Rural Development Council

RDC has joined the Iowa Rural Development Council as recommended by the BOOST grant. No cost. Membership provides newsletter access, marketing materials, and classes. Ben to post the newsletter link on the RDC Facebook page.

BOOST Grant Update

The four community pillars have been published to the community through the Redfield Review with a call for interested residents to contact RDC and engage with the pillar area of their choice. Awaiting community response.

Baseball Fencing and Dug-Outs

Fencing complete. Check delivered earlier in the day. Breakfast proceeds sufficient to wrap the dugouts; work continues. Board invited to view the new fence and dugouts after the meeting (optional).

Park Swing Restoration

Awaiting sandblasting quote from the city. Board rejected dry ice blasting due to cost (approximately 5x more expensive than standard sandblasting). No motion made; item continues to September.

Community Recognition - Dustin & Cristin Lantz

As a gesture of thank you for years of dedicated service to the Redfield community, the RDC discussed and proposed a personal thank-you gift of recognition to the past President, Dustin Lantz and Secretary, Cristin Lantz. Board approved local Perry business gift certificates for Dustin and Cristin as a token of gratitude for years of service. Motion made and seconded. All voted ayes.

Monthly Community Meals

September closed (Labor Day).

October committed to Adel Masons.

November closed (election week).

December closed (Winterfest proximity).

Rate discussion: Board discussed the gap between the \$500 winter (Legion) and \$750 summer group breakfast rates. Direction is to close the gap by targeting \$625 as the standard group rate. The Legion warrants a lower rate given their significant community contributions including scholarships and Booster Club support. Jim to approach the Legion and report back. No formal motion taken.

● AROUND TOWN — REDFIELD DEVELOPMENT CONT.

Old Settlers Days Survey Results

Ben reported 10 respondents. Overall experience positive with bands and water fights well received. Requests included more food trucks (Mexican truck mentioned), daytime kid activities, unique additions (talent show, 5K, hay bale throwing), and later bar hours. Frustration noted that the petting zoo left too early. Volunteer interest was split roughly 50/50; contact information collected from willing respondents for future outreach. Ben and Jim agreed the more useful survey work happens during planning for the next event, not as post-event feedback.

NEW BUSINESS

Citizen Spotlight Program - Ben proposed a quarterly citizen spotlight in the Redfield Review with possible business spotlights in between. Rather than the board selecting recipients, community members will be invited to nominate through an open Facebook survey with a link and QR code in the Redfield Review. If community response is weak, the board will source names directly. Ben to create the nomination form.

Redfield Senior Citizens Home Fiscal Sponsorship - Heather Pote, who has taken over management of the retirement home from Tammy Snyder, requested that RDC act as fiscal sponsor. The home is a 501(c)(B) and does not qualify for grants requiring 501(c)(3) status. Heather is targeting the Dallas County Foundation grant (approximately \$20,000 with in-kind match), AARP, and Habitat for Humanity ReStore for apartment renovations including kitchen cabinets, countertops, high-rise toilets, commercial washers and dryers, and exterior security lighting. Heather would handle all paperwork, grant applications, receipts, and reporting; RDC would only need to sign off. Dallas County Foundation enrollment opens in January with awards typically announced by March. Heather referenced 13 years of prior experience with a similar arrangement for the Raccoon Valley Youth Football League. Board agreed to research and discuss at the September meeting. Decision needed no later than September; if RDC declines, Heather will approach the city.

501(c)(3) Compliance Review - Ryan raised a question about RDC's annual IRS filing (Form 990-N postcard for organizations under \$50,000 in revenue) and general 501(c)(3) governance. Ryan and Jim to schedule a meeting with attorney Eric Reinhart to review filing requirements, insurance and liability language on fiscal sponsorships, and general compliance.

West Central Valley Booster Club Sponsorship - Heather presented the annual Booster Club sponsorship request. Board approved a \$1,000 sponsorship (from the Chamber account) at the level that includes a medium ad in all programs, video board sponsorship, a 4x8 custom vinyl banner, and a family activity pass. Estimated audience approximately 3,000 attendees across the athletic year from football through soccer. Banner will feature the RDC logo and a QR code, with the QR destination updated throughout the year to promote current RDC initiatives such as the Redfield Review sign-up, Winterfest, and community meals. Ryan motioned, seconded. All voted ayes. Ben to design the banner artwork and send logo and QR to Jim (at bank email) for handoff to Heather.

Winterfest - Heather to bring poster options; poster decision date to be set. Chili cook-off returning; Kristy handling vendor coordination. Coordination with Vinton on details ongoing.

Trunk or Treat, Saturday October 31 - Heather and Tiawny co-organize the event. RDC will participate with A-frame signage and a candy and brochure giveaway (brochure includes QR code to RDC materials). Jim is not available Halloween evening; Jim to purchase candy and decor and arrange a decorator or volunteer. Board discussed using the event as a volunteer recruitment opportunity with a specific ask rather than a general call for help. Ben to publish a photo-based Facebook post using last year's images with a specific volunteer ask, and to include a volunteer blurb in the October Redfield Review. Board members to personally invite Lindsay Willis and Darren Newman.

Iowa Leadership Exchange Conference - Two-day conference October 27 and 28 at Central College in Pella covering city leadership, volunteer recruitment, and community development topics. Cost is \$100 per attendee if registered by August 31 (regular price \$150). Cost eligible for BOOST grant funds. Any interested board members to notify Jim before August 31.

Volunteer Recruitment Strategy - Extended discussion on chronic volunteer shortages. Consensus is that general asks fail while specific asks succeed. Strategy going forward is to post targeted, task-specific volunteer requests on Facebook with photo or video from prior events, use community meal service events as recruitment touchpoints with a clipboard sign-up at the door, and personally invite specific community members with capacity. Ben to lead social media execution.

Meeting adjourned at 7:30pm.
